PRESENTATION FROM AMERICAN RED CROSS REPRESENTATIVE KELLEY DELONG REGARDING THE UPCOMING BLOOD DRIVE AT THE WILLIAM COSTICK ACTIVITIES CENTER ON JUNE 4, 2015.

Kelley DeLong, Red Cross Representative, stated that she was impressed with all the volunteers at the meeting this evening and giving blood is also voluntary and she encourages everyone to donate blood on June 4, 2015 at the Costick Center. She explained that every time someone donates one pint of blood they help save three lives and 37 percent of people can give blood, but unfortunately in Southeastern Michigan only 5 percent donate. She stated that they are experiencing a shortage in blood and education is key in getting information out that donors are needed and she asked that everyone talk with their family, friends and community to spread the word. **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMISSION
TIP OF THE MONTH
MAY 2015**

In the month of May, the Emergency Preparedness Commission reminds everyone to think summer, but be prepared for summer-related situations.

Summer in Farmington Hills is long anticipated and never seems to last long enough, so it is easy to forget that hyperthermia (high body temperature) can be life threatening and other heat emergencies can cause trauma and suffering. Yet heat illnesses are easily preventable by taking necessary precautions in hot weather.

Common causes of heat emergencies include high temperature and humidity, dehydration, prolonged or excessive exercise, excess clothing, alcohol use, and certain medications.

Heat emergencies can be prevented by wearing loose-fitting, lightweight clothing, resting frequently and seeking shade when possible, avoiding hot places, drinking adequate fluids, exercising gradually and increasing water intake.

*** Remember: Never leave a child (or a pet) unattended in a vehicle.*

**Mental Health Month
May 2015**

WHEREAS, one in five Americans will experience a mental health illness that requires treatment at some point in their lives; and

WHEREAS, mental health is critical for our individual well-being and vitality, as well as that of our families, businesses, and communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Barry Brickner, Mayor of the City of Farmington Hills, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim May 2015 as **Mental Health Month** in the City of Farmington Hills and call upon our citizens, government agencies, public and private institutions, businesses, and schools to help increase the awareness and understanding of mental illness and the need for appropriate and accessible services for all people to promote recovery.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE BY STATE REPRESENTATIVE CHRISTINE GREIG

Representative Greig updated Council on the following issues and legislation:

- Proposed Energy Plans related to Renewable Energy Standards
- Alternate plans to approach road funding due to the failure of Proposal 1
- Senate Bill 248 on Auto No-Fault Insurance – Much of the public and Oakland County in particular has been standing firm on not supporting Senate Bill 248 and it appears the Bill has stalled.
- Revenue Estimating Conference is scheduled for Friday, May 15th. The Senate and the House will review the budget. Revenue sharing seems to be consistent between the plans.
- School Aid Funding Proposals
- Series of Bills for the Personal Property Tax - Clean Up package
- House Judiciary is hearing testimony on the Medical Marijuana Bills, which center around dispensaries and infused products.

Representative Greig noted that she is on the Education and Workforce and Talent and Communication and Technology Committees and there has not been much activity lately. She feels Education will start heating up with Teachers evaluations down the road once they get through the Bake Sale Testimony where Boy Scouts want to sell donuts and Gatorade at lunch.

Representative Greig mentioned that she serves on the Talent and Place Caucus that brings in business partners, together with Michigan Municipal League, and is bicameral and bipartisan. The Caucus is trying to come up with packages of legislation for place making and business loans in order to help grow communities.

She also serves on the Auto Caucus and is working closely with MichAuto looking for ideas to keep auto industry talent in the State.

Representative Greig stated that her first Bill submitted was to ban micro beads in facial products and toothpaste. She explained that the beads are too small and pass through the water filtration system. The Bill was assigned to the Department of Natural Resources and they are working to come up with a bipartisan solution and a good environmental Bill that will benefit everyone.

Mayor Pro-Tem Bruce commented on the auto no-fault Bill funding available that insurance companies want and why they are willing to take away auto no-fault.

Representative Greig stated there was concern expressed over a lack of transparency and reporting on this fund and the money returned is minimal for the benefits lost.

Dr. Bruce feels this is a power and money issue on behalf of the insurance industry. He inquired if there has been any discussion on eliminating short-term insurance policies.

Councilmember Knol stated that there have been Bills introduced on short-term policies, but they have gone nowhere.

Councilmember Lerner acknowledged a letter from a resident in the 10 Mile/Middlebelt Road area regarding the deer population issue.

Mayor Brickner indicated that many Councilmembers have received similar correspondence and Assistant City Manager Boyer is looking into the process on how to address this issue.

- Ample off-street parking is provided for attendees.
- Residents of the subdivision affected by the event are notified.
- Applicant has requested Police Department assistance and agrees to reimburse the Department for staffing overtime costs.
- The site will be free of obstacles that would inhibit emergency Police and Fire response and Fire Lanes shall not be blocked or restricted.
- An electrical permit must be obtained and approved inspection.
- Any electrical equipment used outside shall comply with applicable code requirements.
- A Certificate of Insurance is submitted prior to the start of the event.
