

SPSC is an intensive 10— week educational program that prepares law enforcement managers for executive positions within their departments. The SPSC is considered the worldwide leader in the development of law enforcement professionals . 

## Farmington Hills Police Department Earns Reaccreditation through Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission

FHPD is one of only nine agencies in the Michigan to be accredited for a third time

The City of Farmington Hills is proud to announce that the Farmington Hills Police Department (FHPD) has successfully achieved reaccreditation through the Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (MLEAC). The reaccreditation was unanimously approved at a MLEAC hearing on Sept. 11 in Mt. Pleasant, Mich.

"This accreditation reflects the commitment of the Farmington Hills Police Department to go above and beyond law enforcement standards to ensure that the City of Farmington Hills is safe and welcoming for all," said City Manager Gary Mekjian. "I'm grateful for the leadership of Chief Jeff King, who first helped the Department achieve accreditation in 2018, and has since advocated for continual improvements to the Department's operations to better serve the community."

Of the 588 law enforcement agencies in Michigan, only 87 have achieved accreditation status, including Farmington Hills. The FHPD is the ninth and largest police department to be reaccredited twice by the MLEAC.


### Prescription Drug Take Back Day 158 POUNDS Collected by the FHPD

On Saturday, October 19th, the Police Department partnered with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and removed over 158 POUNDS of expired, unused, or unwanted prescription drugs safely and anonymously from homes throughout the community. All collected drugs were destroyed by the DEA in accordance with federal and state laws and regulations.

A medicine drop box is located in the Police Department lobby at 31655 W. Eleven Mile Road that accepts prescription drug drop-offs 24 hours a day, seven days a week.



#### **Narcan Trainings for Residents**



NARCAN Nasal Spray may counteract the life-threatening effects of an opioid overdose. Designed for use in the community, NARCAN Nasal Spray is needle-free and ready to use.

- 20 Drug overdoses in 2023 (5 deaths).
- Narcan was administered 14 times by Police Personnel.



Deterra permanently deactivates any medication including opioids, thereby preventing drug misuse.

- 200+ pouches were given out.
- Each pouch has a water-soluble inner pod containing activated carbon.

#### WHAT IS COMEBACK?

The Comeback Quick Response Team (QRT) program enlists a community-based team consisting of a plainclothes police officer, a peer recovery coach, and a family recovery coach. Teams perform outreach at the homes of individuals and families impacted by substance use, offering resources such as:

- · Connection to inpatient and outpatient treatment services
- · Peer and family recovery coaching services
- Naloxone/harm-reduction services
- · Referrals to other community resources

People trained in the proper use of naloxone: 808

Fentanyl test kits distributed: 747


# Fatal Car Crashes-3
